

It's hard to believe that by the time you read this, over onehalf of my term as your NNJSDA president will be over. We've had a great beginning of the square dance season this year.

First there was the inaugural Blast Class in October (page 18). This was followed in November by the 37th Annual Mini-Festival where more than 350 dancers from the tri-state area and beyond enjoyed dancing for five hours to callers Vic Ceder, Don Beck, and Butch Adams, and cuer Mary Pickett (page 37). Check page 4 for a list of upcoming exciting NNJSDA events.

The Gathering 2012 will be held on September 29, 2012, in a new location – the Franklin Township Senior Center in Somerset, where Rutgers Promenaders dance. The theme for the Gathering is "Let Us Speak Together," with keynote speaker Butch Adams. He will also call the evening dance, with Mary Pickett cueing rounds. The format for the day will be slightly different. Watch for details in the coming months.

We encourage all dancers to visit other clubs. The last issue of *Grand Square* has a center map section that you can remove for handy directions to all member clubs. When you visit other clubs, you get an opportunity to dance to new callers, meet dancers you may not have met before, and see how other clubs function.

Square Dance Lovers

Twenty loving couples responded to the request for people who met and married through square dancing. As Valentine's Day approaches, we are pleased to share brief summaries of their stories. Note that italics indicate current club membership and direct quotes. Two years separated by a comma inside parentheses (2007, 2011) indicate when the couple met and married. Enjoy. ... Lise Greene

Nancy (Caufield) ♥ Jim Anderson (2007, 2011) – Jefferson *Reelers*, Lakeland Squares

<u>Dancing</u>: Jim learned in California. Nancy's mother gave her a pair of square dance shoes. Years later, she remembered those shoes and looked online for the nearest club. *Square dancing added the joy in my life that was missing*.



<u>Meeting</u>: (Nancy) Jim attended a barn dance at Lakeland Squares and I asked if he would like to dance. He said "yes" and the rest is history. (Jim) There was definitely something intriguing about her.

<u>Memories</u>: Our worst square dance trip was driving to Western Wheelers during a horrendous storm. When we got there the power was out. But square dancers don't give up and we danced by candlelight.



Dot ♥ Don Coy (1986, 1990) – Brooklyn, NY

Regular caller for AleMo Squares and Pelham Promenaders <u>Dancing</u>: Don went to his first square dance to please his first wife.

Meeting: Don and Dot met at the National Convention in Indianapolis. I liked Dot because she was so peppy and loved

to dance. I knew she was right for me because of her positive attitude about life. We danced one tip at our reception.

Memories: Traveling and participating in 25 National Square Dance Conventions. Square dancing and calling has been my fun thing to do for 39 years. If it were not for square dancing, I would not have met the love of my life.



Pat ♥ Don Elliott (1987, 1992) – Ringoes

Hunterdon Flutterwheels, Fantastic Bears, Saucon Squares and Rounds

<u>Meeting</u>: Don attended an open house at Warren Wheelers. They sent him for lessons to Hunterdon Flutterwheels, where Pat had agreed to be a partner for a



single man – Don! We got comfortable with each other and thought that since we could get along, we should get married! They wore square dance outfits for the wedding and Dalt Young called squares at the reception.

Memories: They enjoyed special dances in Pennsylvania with the callers doing skits. A bad memory is Dalt Young's death at a New Year's Eve party.



Mary Ann (Ryan) ♥ John Erdek (1977, 1978) – Millstone Rutgers Promenaders

<u>Dancing</u>: A co-worker pretty much dragged me kicking and screaming to a Rutgers "hi-lo" dance. He was concerned about my introverted personality (not knowing that at the time I was an inveterate "disco queen").

<u>Meeting</u>: John was already a member of Rutgers, and they met at the hi-lo. They had an impromptu square dance in the yard of John's parents' home near the church before the start of their wedding reception.


<u>More</u>: Square dancing is still in the family through the addition of Theresa, who is now at the C1 level along with her parents.



Nina ♥ Al Gerhold (1979, 1981) – Moorestown

Rutgers Promenaders

<u>Dancing</u>: Nina wanted to square dance because her parents had so much fun dancing. Al's high school teacher was an oddity in gym class square dancing – a real caller! <u>Meeting</u>: They met during lessons at Rutgers. We were in a square that did nothing but crash, and we were following Betsy Gotta's advice [to laugh it off and square up again]. The next week, Al walked into the lesson as I was looking for a partner.



Betsy (Seele) ♥ Roy Gotta (1972, 1974) – North Brunswick *Rutgers Promenaders*

<u>Dancing/Meeting</u>: Betsy learned to dance in a program for kids at the YMCA. When Roy was in college, his fiancée brought him (kicking and screaming) to a class taught by Betsy. When Roy's engagement ended, Betsy



invited him to be her partner for the Delaware Valley Festival. Two months later, they were engaged. At their wedding reception, Betsy and her father, Art Seele, called tips for both experienced dancers and beginners during the band's breaks.

Memories: Betsy and Roy rented their guest room to women in the club, at least three of whom married men from the club.



Carin (Williams) ♥ Frank Gufert (2009, 2011) – Woodcliff Lake Circle Eights

<u>Dancing</u>: (Frank) *I started dancing to have something in common to do with my first wife*. (Carin) *I wanted to provide an Ecuadorian exchange student with an "American" experience. We took square dance lessons through the adult education program.*

Meeting: Frank was an angel for Carin's class, and they discovered a shared German heritage and many other commonalities. It's hard to say when I knew he was the right one, but I did sense early on that he was very special. Paul Ingis called at the wedding reception. On a square dance sightseeing honeymoon in Germany, they enjoyed dancing with German and American callers and dancers.



Patrice ♥ Bill Hartung (1985, 1987) – Magnolia, DE Pepper Steppers, Belles & Beaux, Rutgers Promenaders, Shooting Stars, Kittyhawk Squares, Magnolia Swingers <u>Dancing</u>: Bill took square dancing for gym credit at Rutgers. Patrice took lessons through a community adult education program after dancing at Bear Mountain with a church young adult group.

<u>Meeting</u>: Shortly after her company relocated, Patrice met Bill at an NNJSDA summer dance and he gave her directions to Rutgers Promenaders, the closest club. *I was older and had enough experience to know that Bill was what I wanted.* For Bill, Patrice was the first girl who attracted him both physically and intellectually. Betsy Gotta called one tip at their wedding reception.

<u>Memories</u>: They both attended a callers' college and Patrice taught square dancing for their club in Mississippi. All five of their children have learned to square dance.




Sharon ♥ Charlie Kittner (1993, 2001) – Honesdale, PA

No current club membership; Charlie is a caller

<u>Dancing</u>: Charlie and his first wife were invited by relatives to take lessons. Sharon started because of a newspaper ad.

<u>Meeting</u>: Charlie and his wife were angels for Sharon's class. There were many times when my wife could not dance because





Kathy ♥ Dan Koft (1987, 1989) – South Brunswick Rutgers Promenaders, Y Squares, M R Square Dance Club Dancing: Dan started dancing in high school with Dick Jones as the caller/instructor for PiR Squares. Kathy started at Rutgers when a co-worker invited her to try it out. Meeting: They met on a double date – but they were not each

other's date! They had a tip at their wedding reception for square dancing friends and then another for all the guests.

Memories: Funny clothes, funny people, ... lots of fun.



Karen (**Kozak**) ♥ **Greg Kushla** (1982, 1987) – Florham Park *Rutgers Promenaders*, Y Squares, Liberty Stars

<u>Dancing</u>: Greg saw square dancing at a campus demo and took lessons. Karen lived in the dorm room next to Greg, who was by then treasurer of Rutgers Promenaders.

Meeting: Greg thought Karen was shy; Karen thought Greg was loud

and rude. However, they had many things in common, and friendship grew into love. Although we didn't realize it at the time, it was pretty apparent to others. Betsy Gotta called and Roy Gotta cued at a "square dance reception" a few weeks before the wedding. Karen became a round dance cuer in 1985.





Ann (Tulp) ♥ John Lovatt (1980, 1983) – Franklin Lakeland Squares, Kittatinny Rangers, Hix & Chix, Sussex Spinners, IDTT, County Squares, Kuntry Kuz'ns, Cloud 9 Rounds Dancing: John's cousins encouraged him to square dance. Ann saw three demos, including one at the Sussex County Fair. Meeting: They met at two student dances, which John attended


with other girls. The next time they met, he was alone. When we danced, we were perfectly in time. I knew he was the one for me. John proposed by asking: "Could I have this dance for the rest of my life?" That song became their first wedding dance.

<u>Memories</u>: At a state convention, Ann and her twin Alice were in a square with two other sets of twins and two sisters who looked alike, each set of sisters dressed the same!



Dianne ♥ Don Madden (1998, 2006) – Forked River *Y Squares*, Pairs and Squares, Elk Mountaineers, Crestwood Village Promenaders

<u>Meeting</u>: Don joined Y Squares the year after Dianne. They became round dance partners and good friends in 2001, and began dating in 2005. During their wedding



Memories: Like many square dancers, we like to dance when we travel.





Linda (Leslie) ♥ Rick Murphy (1980, 1981) – Morristown *Reelers*, Rutgers Promenaders

<u>Dancing</u>: Rick attended Rutgers Promenaders' hi-lo dances and took lessons in his junior year. Linda's parents had signed her up for lessons with a teen club. In college, a friend who was in Rutgers Promenaders brought her to a hi-lo.

<u>Meeting</u>: Linda took lessons and met Rick, who was an angel. Linda remembers dancing in the Student Center to a loud disco song that drew other curious students. <u>Memories</u>: Both have enjoyed national conventions. *The best squares we have been in have been those that can laugh at the breakdowns but keep on dancing*.



Ginny (Overberg) ♥ Jeff Platania (1980, 1985) – Somerset *Rutgers Promenaders*

<u>Dancing</u>: Ginny started with Teen Promenaders and joined Rutgers Promenaders as a Douglass College student. Jeff started with Rutgers Promenaders three years later when his best friend dragged him there to meet new women.



Meeting: (Jeff) I told my friend: "That's the girl I'm going to marry." (Ginny) We dated for five months and broke up. Nine months later, a thought popped into my head: "That's the man I'm going to marry." Betsy Gotta called a tip at the reception. Memories: Dancing on a cruise through the Bermuda Triangle; winter barbecues at the Gotta home; seeing children of the old crew dancing as "The Next Generation."



Helena ♥ Ken Robinson (1977, 1979) – Hillsborough *Rutgers Promenaders*


<u>Meeting</u>: Ken's square dancer parents met Helena at a dance and got her phone number. Ken called and took her to see *The World's Greatest Lover*. Ten weeks later, he proposed. <u>Dancing</u>: Ken hated square dancing until Helena motivated

him to take lessons with Betsy Gotta. They progressed quickly to Challenge 4 dancing. <u>Memories</u>: Helena underwent cancer surgery in 1981. They spent the following 10 years dancing all over the country. When the cancer recurred in 1991, Helena endured about one surgery per year, but continued dancing until her passing in 2005.



Connie (Seiler) ♥ **Terry Schmalzried** (1986, 1994) – Morganville *Rutgers Promenaders*, Princeton Rounds, Red Rose (Exhibition), BACtracks, tagBACs, Tip & Ringers, 2 Bee Squares

<u>Dancing</u>: Connie responded to an ad in the Rutgers student newspaper. Terry took lessons through Bell Labs during his first job. Meeting: Terry's instructor suggested that he dance with Rutgers







Mary (Cottone) ♥ Bill Sellar (1983, 1988) – South River Rutgers Promenaders, Ridge Squares, Conejo Swingers Dancing: Mary and Bill had both belonged to teen clubs. Later, Mary saw a Rutgers Promenaders ad in the university newspaper. She joined and became class coordinator. Bill's mother saw an ad in a local paper and suggested that he and his brother sign up.

<u>Meeting</u>: Bill went to lessons, met the class coordinator, and ...

Betsy and Roy Gotta led a square dance tip and a round at their wedding reception.

Memories: Dancing at the Statue of Liberty centennial celebration at Giants Stadium

on July 6, 1986. Their younger daughter is also a Rutgers Promenader.



Holly ♥ Bill Smythe (1996, 1998) – Warren

Bee Sharps, Mountain Squares, Rutgers Promenaders, Friendly Squares, Valley Squares, Solitaires, Harmony Dancers, Do-Si-Doers, Footloose Squares, Golden Triangle Singles

<u>Dancing</u>: Maria Light invited Bill to take lessons at Rutgers Promenaders. Holly saw a newspaper ad from a teen club.



<u>Meeting</u>: After moving to New Jersey, Holly attended a Bee Sharps dance where Bill happened to be visiting. Twenty months later, Bill proposed during a dance while John Kaltenthaler did "diamond" calls. They had a square dance reception a week after the wedding with John calling and Dave Roberts cueing.

Memories: Bill remembers dancing 14 days in a row!



Alice (Tulp) ♥ Michael Winnick (2002, 2004) – Massapequa, NY Lee Kopman's and Todd Fellegy's caller-run clubs, Lakeland Squares, Kittatinny Rangers, Sussex Spinners, Western Wheelers, Motiv8ors, IDTT (I'll Dance To That), Cloud 9 Round Dance Dancing: After participating in a Sussex County Fair demo, Alice took lessons at Sussex Spinners with her mother and two

sisters. Michael took lessons with Lou Flego on Long Island.

Meeting: (Alice's first husband) My identical twin sister and I met our husbands the same night at a Kittatinny Rangers student dance. When Andrew Goodell walked in, I thought: "Wow, that's the man I want to marry!" Peg Dockry called squares and cued rounds at the wedding. After Andrew passed away, Alice met Michael at a singles convention. When I saw Alice for the first time, I thought: "She's the one!" He proposed at a Country Promenaders dance when Jim Snyder called to "Who the Heck Is Alice?" Then Steve Bradt cued "Could I Have This Dance?" (Mike had secretly asked Mary Pickett to teach it to him.) Lee and Lilith Kopman called and led line dancing at the reception.

<u>More</u>: Michael went to callers school in 2005 and has taught classes in Mainstream, Plus, and Advanced. Alice had a premonition that she was going to marry a caller!



"Tips for Your Tips"

A series devoted to helping you become a more confident dancer

Space: The Dancer's Frontier

Dancing involves people moving across the dance floor to music. How you use the space will affect how smoothly and easily you dance.

- 1. Keeping your square "tight" or compact makes it easier to *identify your square's formation at any given time; identify your position in it;* and *keep your formation neat* (lines, waves, and columns should be straight, and parallel to the walls and each other). Dancing in a compact square is more relaxing because it is easier to complete the calls in the allotted time without having to rush or run. Also, you can more comfortably touch hands with adjacent dancers while keeping your shoulders and elbows relaxed. In square dancing, neatness counts. If your column is not straight, adjust your position so that you are directly lined up with the other dancers in your column.
- 2. "Square breathing" is similar to your chest moving out and in while you are inhaling and exhaling. When Heads Promenade 1/2 Way is called from a static square, the side dancers step forward temporarily so the heads don't have to travel as far. When a call leaves your square very spread out, adjust back in ("tighten up" the square) to make it easier to see your formation and do the next call.
- 3. Anticipate how much space you need to cover for your part of the call, and modify your pace and stride length accordingly. During All Eight Circulate, out-facing end dancers must take longer strides and move faster because they need to cover a longer distance than the other dancers; conversely, the other dancers need to take shorter strides. During Couples Trade, the centermost dancers must take extremely small steps. During Relay the Deucey (a Plus call), dancers must alternately take longer and shorter strides for the square to smoothly and successfully execute the call.
- 4. During a passing action (such as Pass Thru), dancers must move off their track as they pass the other dancer, *followed by* adjusting back onto their track. If there is limited space available, you may need to turn slightly sideways to avoid bumping into another dancer.
- 5. Keep in mind the footprints that should be occupied at the end of a call *while* you are performing the call. For example, the same two spots on the floor should be occupied both before and after a Courtesy Turn. For this to happen, the left hand dancer must back up while the right hand dancer moves forward. Otherwise, the resulting couples will not be facing one another directly. During Boys Run, the girl must step into the boy's initial spot for the couple to occupy the same two spots on the floor at the end of the call.
- 6. During Step to a Wave, *each* dancer must adjust sideways slightly. After the call, the resulting waves should be parallel and lined up.

Hackers, Phishers, and Spammers (Oh MY!)

Just how safe is your identity from "hackers"? Well, that depends on who you are. If you receive and send emails, surf, and buy a few things on the internet, you can do it safely; your name, address, and phone numbers are already easily obtainable in most cases, so protecting these is useless. (If you run a business from the computer, you need more stringent safeguards than those of us who have no sensitive information belonging to other people on our machines.)

Hacker: This term refers to someone who comes in over your internet connection ("hacks in") and gets information from your computer. Unless you have a public identity that attracts hackers (an accountant, for example), no one is going to invest time to get in to your computer. Saying someone "hacked" your email really means you somehow gave out your email password, and now someone is using your email to send spam (aka junk email). Note that having a typed list of passwords in your computer does not attract hackers. It may attract a 15-year-old who sits down at your computer, but not someone dialing in over your internet connection.

Giving away a computer? Even if the computer is "broken," make sure all data have been totally erased (called a Department of Defense overwrite) before you give it or throw it away. Otherwise your files are my files. ...

Public Computers: Avoid doing business on public computers and wireless (Wi-Fi) networks, and *always* click the "log out" button when you finish using any website you logged on to. Otherwise I can get on after you leave and play with your brokerage account, send emails in your name, etc. One manager left himself logged on to a shared work computer; after he left, staff went through his work email and forwarded messages to employees being discussed for promotion – not a pretty scene.

Smart Phones: These hold passwords and other vital info. Password protect and put tracking apps on them. Once they're in someone else's hands, it is too late!

Passwords: Be password smart. Not every computer needs a password, but it protects documents on computers that are accessible to others whom you have not authorized. Using a password on a home computer every time you log in is a waste of energy – unless, of course, you don't want the 15-year-olds to have access. In that case, don't give it out, at all, ever – a password is useless if anyone learns it! (Exception: Someone you are paying to repair a computer has security and confidentiality concerns that match yours, and *paying* is the operative word. That 15-year-old may be handy, but hardly secure!)

Don't use the same password for everything. Neither should you use a different password for everything, because it becomes too confusing. Pick three passwords. One should be complicated, to use for money transactions such as banking, PayPal, brokerage, and credit cards. Create a password that is eight to 14 characters, uses upper and lower case, numbers, letters, AND a symbol. A recent security journal says that "it would typically take ... 2½ hours to crack the strongest 7-character password ... an 8-character password ... about 10 days, and a 9-character ... approximately 2½ years." Do not use a favorite date, a name, or other real words. Be creative – but don't brag about it and don't hang it on a sticky on the computer! Protect this password religiously.

Create two additional (shorter) passwords for all other log-ons; make them at least eight characters, though, and not at all similar to the one used for money transactions. These passwords wouldn't attract a hacker – unless you have a really interesting purchase history at Amazon. Decide on a scheme to remember which is used where. Perhaps they'll be for sites with names beginning A-K/L-Z, or for email/all other purposes.

Phishing: A phisher is someone who looks like (or pretends to be) a website or an account you own, but is actually a swindler in the worst sense. Never provide your user name, password, account number, or other sensitive information in emails or over the phone – yes, phishing has come to your local phone number (usually as a credit card alert)! Most passwords get inadvertently given out by people clicking on a link in an email that looks legitimate, and then entering their personal information when asked for it. As I wrote in the last issue, DON'T ever click a link unless the sender tells you what it is for in the email message. Example: If an email appears to be from your bank, go to your Favorites or Bookmarks list and click it there, or type it in, letter by letter. After all, if you put it there, it will take you to your bank, not to some goodfella in Timbuktu. ...

Shopping online: Theft happens no more frequently online than at the cash register, so why lose all the benefits of buying online because of fear? Instead, have one credit card that you use only for online shopping. Scrutinize the statement, item by item, every month and compare it to the email confirmations you received for online purchases. Then you will know if someone else uses the number. If the number leaked and you report it immediately, you are not liable for charges; the credit card company will remove the charges and may request to change the card number, just as if you had lost the card.

Never give access to your bank account information to any site or by phone.

Email addresses: These frequently get compromised with spam by being given out or sold (from the top of emails that someone forwards and fails to clean up). Again, three is a lucky number: one email address for work or professional interests that sounds appropriate; a personal one for family/friends; and a third for online. Verizon (the internet service provider we pay to get online at my home) allowed me to create seven email addresses when I signed up. I use one of them for my online address (and judging from the amount of spam I get on it, some sites I have used it on seem to have sold it to spammers). I have my "real" addresses at Gmail. Gmail, AOL, Hotmail, Yahoo!, Mail.com, and others are free emails that you can keep even if you change to another internet service provider.

Websites: Many allow only registered users to access certain content, and require you to provide some personal information to register. *That information does not have to be real so that it leads back to you.* Invent a fake persona for the sites that make you sign on before you can comment/read articles or that you may not go back to. But keep a list of the site, your user name, and password, so you can remember who "you" are in case you do want to go back. Exception: Addresses for shopping sites obviously need to be real.

The world has gotten more complicated, but understanding a few rules will keep you safe and surfing happily ever after.

CCNJ President's Message

Mid-Winter Mania – CCNJ again presents Mid-Winter Mania, a chance for new dancers to hear many callers and to dance with members of other clubs. See the ad in this issue of *Grand Square* and please plan to participate.



Computers – In an interview* with Bob Brundage, Jonesy Jones, one of the early square dance

recording artists, tells how he first started calling using a megaphone and then later switched to a microphone and amplifier. He got his start by leading a band that played for square dances. Later he began to use records when he called. This was just after World War II, when amplifiers and records changed forever how we square dance. It was a paradigm shift and the square dance community changed slowly, lamenting the loss of live bands and painfully learning the newfangled "hash" calling.

Over the years since then, there have been very few further technical innovations. Hilton built amplifiers that allowed callers to adjust the voice and the music separately, making the voice easier to understand. Yak Stack speakers made the caller understandable without draping wires and speakers along the sides of a hall, and Xerox copiers made it easier for club officers to print flyers and get newsletters to members. However, in general, square dancing technology has stayed the same for 50 years, while music technology progressed from tape players to CD players to iPods and iPhones.

With the advent of computers, square dancing is undergoing another paradigm shift. Callers are using computers instead of turntables. They can now have thousands of songs on their computer and some have taken to playing background music between tips. Square dance publications are appearing online, and clubs have dance dates and flyers available online for those with computers and phone-based search apps. I'm wondering: Are we embracing this new technology to help square dancing grow, or are we lamenting the loss of records, mimeographs, and telephone chains? How could new technology be used to grow our activity even further?

NNJSDA is leading the way by providing email lists to reach dancers and Association officers. Does your club have an email list? Does your club have a website? The Reelers' club newsletter is online and *Grand Square* is available online. Newspapers used to be the way to reach prospective dancers. Nowadays, communities are starting their own online newspapers called "patches." Does your publicity committee put articles in your local patch? Short square dance instruction videos and excellent square dance call animations are available online. Do you tell your new dancers about them? GPS devices in cars help you find dance venues, and detailed directions can be had from map websites. And, of course, there is Facebook to spread the word, as has recently been suggested.

What's next? Can computer technology be harnessed to make square dancing even better? How about an app to find out what dances are available anywhere in the country as dancers travel? How about an app to help potential square dancers find places to dance?

Thirty years ago, people bought square dance records and danced to them in their basements. However, as the dancers moved up the technology ladder to tape and CD players, square dance music stayed on records – which the dancers no longer had the equipment to play. What would change if everyone could get square dance music for \$1 per tune at Amazon.com and have instant downloads? Would dancers – especially those who are younger, college age, and having children later in life begin having basement dances again?

Do you have ideas about how new technology can be used to transform and improve our activity? If so, let your club officers, the NNJSDA officers, and the callers know. Square dancing is in the middle of the computer paradigm shift. Let's take advantage of it. Instead of talking about how it was, let's talk about what it can be if we embrace this new technology fully.

In Memoriam: Manny Amor

New Jersey square dance caller Manny Amor passed away on November 22, 2011. He was loved and respected by countless dancers.

Manny became a caller in 1953 and was well known to many clubs on the east coast, especially those in the Jersey shore area and Staten Island. He was a charter member of the Callers' Council of New Jersey, the author of numerous square dance calls, and the recipient of national and international awards.

Manny enjoyed writing and recording folk music. He was also an avid cartoonist whose works appeared regularly in *Grand Square* for several years.



Born in Brooklyn and educated in Florida, Manny lived in Lakewood for most of his life. He taught physical education in Freehold Township for 26 years and coached cross country, leading the team to a 1973 state title. He retired in 1992.


"Manny was a special friend to me and will be missed very much," said dancer Evelyn Wooley. "He was a great caller and everyone loved to hear him." She added that he was an excellent teacher. "Manny had the patience of a saint. I was his student and a member of both clubs that he founded: Star Thru Squares, which no longer exists, and Do-Si-Dos, where Gardner Patton now calls."

Louis and Jan Thompson also took Mainstream and Plus lessons with Manny, recalling him as the creator of the call Triple Scoot. "We fondly remember him for the various hats he wore to holiday dances and his clever square dance cartoons." Bill Smythe described a crazy hat dance with Hill City Squares, during which all the dancers tossed their hats to Manny and "the whole stage was covered in hats!"

Manny leaves behind a son, two daughters, many other relatives, and a host of friends. He also leaves a wonderful legacy of square dance leadership.



back page and in your article header? If not, send a clearance request to the Recording Secretary (see page 2) to update the information.

How to Access the Grand Square Archive

The Association's website has all of the *Grand Square* issues on file as PDFs, accessible from your computer. Gardner Patton spent ages scanning them all in, and we can search through them with ease. Here's how to do so:

Go to nnjsda.org/grand_square and click on "Historical Grand Square Magazines 1959-2007." At the top, the Grand Square issues are listed by decade, and a search bar is beneath that.

Let's say you want to find out when your club was first listed in *Grand Square*. Type in your club name. Be aware that some names have been recycled over the years. When I searched "Flutterwheels," for example, I learned that there were two in the NNJSDA history: West Milford Flutterwheels and Hunterdon Flutterwheels. (West Milford started in 1979 and disbanded in 1987.) The Hunterdon Flutterwheels graduation class is listed in the March 1972 issue and it is described as being a new club, but it did not join NNJSDA at that time. The September 1992 issue says the club celebrated its 20th anniversary by joining NNJSDA.

A list of issues in which the search term is found will come up in chronological order (earliest to latest). Clicking on one of them opens the issue in another window. If you want to open several at once, right-click and then click Open in New Tab.

At the top of each window is a Zoom button so you can see the issue full page, actual size (100%), or any variation. There is also a Find box so you can search through the issue. Note that some ads were handwritten and are not included in the search, so if you want to find a club ad in an issue that does not have an index in the back, you will need to look through the issue to find the ad.

And if you are interested in the history NNJSDA has on your club to see if it matches what you have on file, go to *nnjsda.org/history/?clubs*. That takes you to a list of all the clubs since 1958 and when they joined. If you have information that is different, or can fill in some of the blanks, please contact me. *Rusty Ball*
