

After an evening of exhilerating twirling and weaving, while on the way home, how often have square dancers remarked to one another, "That was a really great dance." We trust that it has been a very frequent occurence for each of our Association members, and if it is not —then it should be. What does constitute a fun dance is strictly a matter of personal taste and not something that can be easily defined.

The definition of a successful affair is something that has occupied our thoughts for a considerable time. Because we have been active as S/D leaders in one capacity or another for many years, planning and running dances which are enjoyed by the majority of those who attend has been of particular concern. The search hasn't really been a problem, rather it has been more of a challenge. Just what ingredients make for a happy three hours of dancing delight? Let's look at some of the factors.

Obviously, the caller contributes a very large share to any S/D event. Sweet voiced or mellow, his message pours from the amplifier as the dancers execute his commands. Important as is his delivery, so is the manner in which the calls are blended - and so is his personality and the music itself. The caller is an artist in his own right - he just can't receive too much credit for his contribution to the procedings.

The hall? Yes, it's an important consideration - but not a major one. Looking at the negative side, no doubt you have danced under adverse conditions - sweltering heat, dingy walls, unfriendly environment, very rough floor - and you have come away more than satisfied.

Ask the hospitality committee whether food and drink influences the attendance. The answer is in the affirmative if a group has established a reputation for its culinary art, but... Have you swung the night away when little or no refreshments were offered, and you couldn't care less? Or, have you been too full of calories after a covered dish or dinner dance to stand up, much less circle to the left? Or, did he say right?

Now let us take a look at the dancers, who are a primary piece of this puzzle. Whether they are good, bad or indifferent, the dancers decidedly influence the overall tone of the affair — not on the basis of their collective skill but rather their attitude. The entire spectrum of square dancing ability can be minutely examined — from high level challenge to the 50-basics club — and who is to judge which sector has the more fun. Is it the serious dancers who rarely smile or those who goof and allemande left to hilarious peals of laughter? It may be neither.


The next time you leave a dance that you've thoroughly enjoyed, one that you truly regret had ended too soon - stop to think as to why it had been such a delightful evening. Was it the talented caller? Was it the refreshments, the decorations, the super smooth floor? Was it the dancers -- those friendly people who made the time fly? We'll wager that it was the last ingredient, more often than not.

Want to experience just such a friendly atmosphere - come to the October 19th "Yikes" Cameron dance - sponsored by your Association. You'll meet dancers from every part of the NNJSDA area - each one anxious to share your dancing pleasure.

In addition to having a great time, you'll be contributing to the financial health of your association - we need that support. We need it 100%. Almost from the day that you began S/D classes, your Association has been a vital part of your enjoyment. Your Association plays a key role in the success of the S/D activity in New Jersey. Come on out - support YOUR dance.





What excitement & fun a S/D Convention is, and our first experience was the 24th National out in Kansas City which was the largest convention ever held: 20,050 in attendance, including 2,000 youth and 2,200 circle dancers. We were quickly caught in a whirlwind of s & r dancing, sewing clinics, fashion shows, over 100 apparel shops, informative panels, round table sessions and seminars, and were 3 of the happiest people anywhere meeting dancers from some of the 50 states and 5 foreign countries who were registered. Our retarded son, Peter, thoroughly enjoyed watching the colorful 18 exhibition groups who danced nightly and sure was anxious to join one particular group of 3-16 yr. olds who performed beautifully.

We had a chance to dance to some of the 550 s/d callers (14 Nationally known full-time travelling callers), 124 round dance & 26 folk/contra leaders, who all volunteer their time for 3 days and pay their own expenses, and certainly do their best to give you all levels of dancing pleasure. 





Buzz groups met for an hour on topics which included S/D Associations:



LEGACY '75 was solution orientated...their position being that a rehash of problems without offering solutions was worthless. Thus clubs and/or associations are urged to press for leadership training in their areas and for a firmer dress code; an accreditation of teachers, callers and cuers; for better coverage and methods of teaching. Shop owners met at many extra sessions to lay the ground work for a national ass'n of shopowners or services to promote, protect and police their particular groups; R/D leaders plan to explore these possibilities at Legacy III. Sound like "An Impossible Dream"? LEGACY I created the environment from which Callerlab grew; set the stage from which a tune clearing house was established by record companies; and established the beginnings of a dress code.

Between group sessions, kaffee klatches discussed other aspects of the total picture. Mini spiels to the assemblage told of incorporation for non-profit; drop out solutions; tax problems; insurance solutions; Doc Tirrell spoke on our NNJSDA clearance program (most were amazed to find it works); Dorothy Shaw, a most charming, delightful and knowledgeable person, spoke on the Lloyd Shaw foundation; the 23rd National Convention color film was shown (our delegates will recall seeing this great film last April) plus an excellent one of our heritage from Shaw Foundation.

Summing it all up in some well chosen words, John Kaltenthaler (PA) said we've only scratched the surface. LEGACY has provided the direction in which we are to head and offers us the guidants. A little over 17 years ago square dancing in NNJ was at a low ebb. Six couples became so concerned over the need for a good promotional program, clearance conflicts, beginner classes, as well as summer dance opportunities that they instigated a plan of action. Eleven clubs shared their beliefs by sending delegates to a meeting. Many of their ideas and suggestions are still being carried out today.

Then, as now, delegates had the responsibility of keeping their clubs informed. As a further means of communication between our scattered membership. GRAND SQUARE was created by Bob Keck in '59. Four years later, Bob turned the edi-

torship over to Bill Geier. Business pressures caused him to turn the task over to the Tirrells in '65. Now thirty-three clubs strong, and still growing, the Association can look back proudly on its many accomplishments, including sponsoring the 7th (and last) Atlantic Convention: publishing its own Basic Manual of S/D figures and other aids for classes including S/D week posters; securing the first official proclamation of S/D week in NJ & NY; underwriting a Caller's Class, a leadership seminar; and holding a Mini-Festival. 



LEGACY II was a pot powrri of leaders and ideas...summed up in the following resolutions:

#### IMAGE

That Legacy '75 reaffirms its concern expressed in Legacy '73\*pertaining to excesses in the activity, and that since impressions are important we encourage all involved in dancing to put forth a constant effort to enhance the positive image we present.

\*197.3 statement: Callers and leaders should educate by example, and instruct that appropriate square dance apparet should be worn at public and open dances at all times. National and area publications should educate the square dance world, that, for the best interest of the activity, dancers should refrain from partaking of alcoholic beverages before or during square dance events.

#### THE BICENTENNIAL

In order to assist the country to participate more fully in the celebration of the bicentennial events, resolved that the trustees of Legacy encourage dancers to make a personal pledge to learn the history of the dance as it has been involved in the growth of our nation and, additionally, pledge to tell America our story through dance exhibitions, media, participation events, conventions, displays and all other sources available.

#### HOW AND WHAT WE DANCE

The Legacy trustees resolve that we agree in principle with Callerlab objectives, resolutions and goals, that similar efforts be made by associations for other forms of the American dance, that we recognize that square dancing, round dancing, and contra dancing are all a part of the American Folk Dance.

#### LEADERSHIP

To stimulate enthusiasm for leadership within the dance activity be it resolved that we recommend the establishment at the local, regional, national and international levels of leadership, training programs, seminars, and/or clinics, be an integral part of the dance program.

Just received from CALLERLAB - There are 17 active committees. One headed by Lee Kopman (NY) is setting out to determine a workable system of identifying the various levels of s/ding. It's a much needed program and hopefully a solution is not too far off. The Quarterly movements committee has selected "Pass the Ocean" and "Ferris Wheel" for Oct., Nov. and Dec.

The SQUARE PINCUSHION makes a circle skirt

First we'll make a newspaper pattern.





Using a large folded sheet of newspaper, measure along the folded edge the required number of inches (as noted in chart below) and with a compass draw a quarter circle.

From this line, using a yardstick measure a second line,
the amount of total inches
of desired skirt length, plus
† for waist seam plus 1 for
hem. Mark several places and
draw a continuous line . Cut
on your two drawn lines. You
now have a half pattern.

Don't worry if the waist amount seems small, with the seam allowance it will be O.K.

You will have to cut two pieces of fabric to make your skirt. The remaining pieces will provide a waistband if you're making a skirt, or part of your bodice if it's a dress.


Stitch your 2 half-circles together (2 seams) leaving an opening about 72 for zipper on upper part of 1 seam. Insert zipper. Attach to waistband in normal manner stretching to fit

if necessary. For a dress.... Cut your back section in two making the addition of a back seam. Sew side seams both closed in regular way. Sew up back seam leaving necessary opening for back zipper. Attach to bodice, then insert zipper.

Finish either item with a machine or hand-stitched hem.
