

FINAL CONVENTION WRAP-UP from your NNJSDA/BOARDWALK Liaisons....

Four summers ago when we were going into Presidency of the NNJSDA, we received a letter of inquiry from the Chairmen of the 26th National asking if our Association would be interested in supporting a Convention in A.C. in '77. Dubiously, 4 officer couples set about attending an in informative meeting in Philly that Sept..

& obviously came back enthused because in the ensuing 4 years, your NNJSDA has promoted this phenomenal event in ways almost too numerous to mention, & to every one who has helped, our heartfelt thanks!

Your 1974 Executive Board started out by tracing, cutting & packaging patterns to go with material kits for sewers to make the official costume to be worn whenever & wherever possible to generate interest, & we surprised the National Convention visitors at our January '74 Delegates Meeting by all Officers being in full dress. Over the years, your NN JSDA sold well over 300 kits of fabric, & we also helped non-sewers find readymade costumes or private dressmakers to help get the costume. We then jumped in with both feet & borrowed a film which was shown to about two dozen clubs in our area, depicting the excitement of a National, & thus we helped to sell about 500 preregistration certificates which allowed purchasers preferential treatment when registration & housing officially opened.

In the summer of '75, the writers bought a car-rack to tote boxes & boxes of GS to the 24th National in Kansas & set out to experience our first convention. We attended meetings, rap sessions & seminars (only danced 3 x's) & met hundreds of very helpful people who shared their knowledge with us. During the following year your Association officers, club officers & many club members travelled thousands of miles to carry the message about A.C., & sold numerous cookhooks along the way for early entertainment by our area hostesses. Last summer we personally went to Hawaii on a tour which ended in Anaheim for the 25th National, & I quess besides again meeting knowledgeable dancers who were ever so willing to clue us in on the do's & don't's for Hospitality, the biggest promotion & excitement came by being among 900 East coast dancers who lined the arena in full costume while our four squares danced a routine which ended in forming an invitation to come to "A C""in " 7 7".

Through all 4 years, of course, we have written volumes of words in at least 8 issues of GS giving our readers a bit of insight on what to expect at a Convention, & all this promotion would never have been possible without help from so many, many people. To publically name all these friends would be virtually impossible, lest we forget someone by sheer oversight, but we could never have done it without the Tirrells who allowed us so much free GS space, & hundreds & hundreds of other interested friends who sat thru our many sales pitches, & even joined the cause along the way - so to each one, our special thanks!

The Hospitality Committee is part of the Social & Special Events Committee on the National Convention Board, & again without naming names, we'd like to say it was a pleasure knowing & working with YOU! (continued on Page 5)

NORTHERN NEW JERSEY SQUARE DANCERS ASSOCIATION

In 1958, six couples became so concerned over the square dance need for a good promotional program, clearance conflicts, beginner classes as well as summer dance opportunities, that they instigated a plan of action. Eleven clubs shared their concern by sending delegates to a meeting, out of which the Northern New Jersey Square Dancers Association was born. Many of their original ideas and

suggestions are still being carried out today. The NNJSDA is incorporated

as a non-profit organization in the state of New Jersey.

Then, as now, delegates had the responsibility of presenting their clubs viewpoints at meetings and of keeping their club informed of activities within the Association. In 1959, as a further means of communication between the widely scattered membership, GRAND SQUARE was created.

Questions often asked about our Association

How many meetings does the NNJSDA hold?

Delegates meetings are held in September, January and April.

Who may attend? .

Any square dancer may attend, but only member club delegates may vote.

Who conducts the business of the Association?

Member club delegates vote on all issues, elect the NNJSDA officers and serve on various committees. The Executive Committee carries out their appointed assignments as constitutionally directed and report their actions to the delegates.

Who makes up the Executive Committee?

The elected officers, immediate NNJSDA past president, Editors of GRAND SQUARE and advisors. Aside from delegates meetings, this committee meets at least four times annually.

How is the NNJSDA financed?

Yearly club dues are minimal. Almost all of the NNJSDA's income is derived from the profits of its summer and special dance program. Its official publication, GRAND SQUARE, is supported by advertising and an annual Booster Drive. The Mini-Festival is self supporting.

Where does the money go?

Most of the profits are spent on printed, promotional material such as diplomas, basic booklets, posters, graduate packets, "What is Modern American Square Dancing?"(promotional material), rosters, attendance pins, etc. The rest is administration and services for the dancers such as LUST (Leadership seminars), Graduates Balls, etc and assisting worthwhile S/D Causes (i.e. Singles Club formation, 1965 Keokuk disaster, Callers School).

How many clubs belong to the NNJSDA?

As of May 1977, it consisted of 34 clubs and I Associate (teen) club. Other applications are pending.


What area is covered?


All of northern New Jersey north of the Monmouth-Middlesex County Line and Richmond and Rockland Counties in New York. Bordering counties may be included upon mutual agreement.



What has the the NNJSDA done, or doing now, for square dancing?

- I- In the first few years, it held classes from which new clubs developed. Presently many clubs conduct their own classes using materials supplied free by the NNJSDA including diplomas, attendance pins, Basic Booklets, poster and other promotional materials.
- 2- Organizes a summer dance program encouraging graduates to Continue using their newly acquired skills by developing a Freeloader program.
- 3- Serves as a clearing agency for special dances of its member clubs (& non-members) thereby minimizing the chance of conflicting dates.
- 4- Assisted with the formulation of the NNJ Round Dance Leaders Council & sponsors a Round of the Month program for area S/D clubs.
- 5- Sponsored the 7th Atlantic Convention in 1961; Assisting with the 26th National S/D Convention which is under the sponsorship of the Federation ation of Delaware Valley Square and Round Dancers.
- 6- Instituted the Callers Carnival, Graduates Ball and Mini-Festival.
- 7- In 1969 appointed a committee of callers who first devised a basic teaching curriculum for classes and then wrote a Basic Manual which was printed & distributed at NNJSDA expense. It has been revised twice.
- 8- Encourages interclub visitations by establishing a Patrons Badge.
- 9- Secured official proclamations of National S/D Week in NJ & NY states. Conducts a poster contest for National S/D week and distributes copies of winner, free for clubs to use for recruiting classes.
- 10- Held leadership seminars for club officers and members in 1972,1973 & 1976. LUST (Let Us Speak Together) is scheduled for Sept. 11, 1977.
- II- Established an insurance program for member clubs.
- 12- Underwrote the expenses of a Callers Class in 1973 & the establishment of a Singles Club (Solitaires) in 1975.
- 13- Informs the dancer of club, area, & national activities. Serves as an area contact for travelling dancers. Besides, GRAND SQUARE, it publishes an annual roster of club information, maps, callers & graduates.
- 14- Participates in the Show Case of Ideas at National S/D Conventions and is represented at LEGACY.
- 15- Cooperates with others interested in the promotion of square dancing.





The Quarterly Selection Committee has selected: FOLLOW YOUR NEIGHBOR and its companion call Follow Your Neighbor AND SPREAD. These calls are requested to be workshopped at Mainstream Club level Dances during the months of July, August and September.

"FOLLOW YOUR NEIGHBOR" starts from Right or Left Hand Parallel ocean waves. On the call, the dancers facing IN step straight ahead to join adjacent forearms and cast 3/4. At the same time, the dancers facing OUT "follow" into their neighbor's position with a 3/4 looping turn (270 degrees) to rejoin the same neighbor with the other hand. Right Hand Waves change into Left Hand Waves and Vice Versa. (It is easy to get into sloppy habits when executing this figure since some callers incorrectly teach the dancers facing out to Run or Fold into the adjacent slot. In the original concept of this call, Deuce Williams was quite emphatic about the dancers doing a 'loop'.) "FOLLOW YOUR NEIGHBOR AND SPREAD" - This is a natural extension of the Follow Your Neighbor. It starts from an Ocean Wave and is executed exactly like FOLLOW YOUR NEIGHBOR BUT, when the "SPREAD" is called for, the dancers who have done the Cast 3/4 will spread apart by sliding sidew ways to become ends of a new Ocean Wave. Those who have done the loop will move into the center position and become the centers of the Wave.


