$\forall$Sol/Harriette Koved 14 Samoset Road, Cranford, NJ 07106 "In recent years the spectre of level has become increasingly prominent, that is dancers \& callers have become more \& more aware of the various stages of ability that may be attained by square dancers. CALLERLAB has been extremely helpful in identifying these levels by tabulating the calls which must be mastered in order to reach each plateau. But it wasn't always this way.

Square dancing's dim past may not have been the "good old days" as people who experienced them are inclined to belleve, but they were a lot simpler. Participants enjoyed themselves in a somewhat different manner the movement progressed $*$ each succeeding year saw new calls added. Adunced \& challenge dancing came on the scene.

Those levels which require the mastery of many, many complex figures fulfill a need or they would not attract the dancers that they do. These people advance to clubs or groups, many of which are closed \& most of whicl are unlisted \& therefore unknown. Those who are involved definitely need the additional challenge as do tennis players \& mountain climbers require increasingly difficult goals.

It has been sald that were it not for the higher levels such people would otherwise be lost to the S/D movement. This is probably true. BUT, they have essentially been lost to what we consider to be the most important aspect of any activity - the perpetuating function, the establishment of a firm foundation.

The higher levels feed on the lower ones - that is dancers for the more complex plateaus are recruited from the $30+$ clubs that form your Association. The "fun" clubs \& the "club level" groups are those which each year enlist \& train new cadre that form the backbone of square dancing. They create the classes, provide the angels, \& work hard through up to 30 lessons to insure that the hobby is infused with fresh talent without which it would waste away. They are the builders.

We cannot categorically state that advanced \& challenge groups do nothing to bring in new people, but if they do so - it is a well-kept secret. But credit must be given to some dancers who are comfortable with many levels \& who also participate in training new dancers. But, unfortunately, they are the exception rather than the rule.

There is no easy, quick solution to this problem. However, both dan= cers \& callers must recognize that higher is not necessarily better - that there is an infinite variety of putting calls together to make them more interesting at every level. As heretical as it may sound, dancers should belong to clubs based on the program provided \& not so much on allegiance to the organization. The real challenge today is to make every level attractive with effort expended toward creating this more ideal climate.

Level has a tendency to segregate dancers - usually at the highest stage of the individual's ability. This is a very tragic mistake. We should all dance at multiple levels - in various clubs of different ratings. We shoul actively participate in each club so that those dancers who are faltering may be encouraged, so that clubs may benefit from more experienced members, \& that the entire movement will be strengthened by the interaction."

This issue THE SQUARE PINCUSHION will make a tiered skirt.........

Many of us like the tiered skirt look and if you'll try it,you'll see it really isn't that difficult
 to make.

The secret of a lovely tiered skirt is to make the tiers with a good deal of fullness-not skimpy. The other thing is to make the tiers graduated not all the same width.

Your finished skirt length should be $1^{\prime \prime}$ longer than your crinoline. Divide this finished length into $3=$ from this figure subtract a little for the uppermost tier and add a little to the lowest tier. Exampleyour length is $24^{\prime \prime}$, divided by $3=8^{\prime \prime}$; take away $2^{\prime \prime}$ making your top tier $6^{\prime \prime}$ and add that $2^{\prime \prime}$ to the bottom one making it $10^{\prime \prime}$ - then your finished tier lengths are $6,8, \& 10^{\prime \prime}$. Remember to add seam allowances to top and bottom edges and allow for a hem on the lowest tier.

Next to figure'how much fabric'... 2 widths of $45^{\prime \prime}$ fabric for the top tier, double that to 4 widths for the middle tier and double again to 8 widths for the lowest tier.

Use a ruffler if your fabric is very light weight to gather, or nylon thread in the bobbin is strong for pulling up the gathers.

Sew the gathered edge of the middle tier to the lower edge of top tier leaving 1 seam open. Sew gathered edge of bottom tier to lower edge of middle tier, again leaving 1 seam open. Hem lower tier's bottom edge. Gather lipper edge of top tier to fit your walst. Before sewing it to a waistband or bodice check the length. If it's too long you can still take a little off the top. Sew up remaining seam to within zipper allowance, then insert zipper if 1t's a skirt(insert zipper after it's joined to the bodice in a dress). On skirt,add
 your waistband and hook $n$ eye and you're ready to dance.

If you made your seams too deep and the finished skirt appears too short-do NOT dispair- a row of trim at the hemline, some eyelet edge for a petticoat look or fringe or pompoms or crocheted edging or even a strip of contrasting fabric(to match a blouse) can save it \& make it look like you planned it that way. Who's to know?

The International Association of Square Dance Callers

From time to time we watch as our club cal lers travel on their annual trek to the calLERLAB convention. Do you ever wonder what goes on at their convention... .

There are a host of topics which are scheduled each year, ranging fron topics on choreography to routine Committee meetings. There is no such thing as free time during the 3 days of convention. Most callers pay their own way so try to schedule as much as possible in the available tim

The convention starts Monday morning at $10: 30$ with an opening session followed by $5 / 6$ concurrent sessions with committees \& an orientation session for first timers \& those who wish to get updated on recent CALLERLAB actions. On Monday afternoon was scheduled two $1 \frac{1}{2}$ hour sessfons on many topics - six topics at $1: 30$ and six more at $3: 30$ with a coffee/tea/coke/ tab break in between. Included were some additional committee meetings as well as topics of prime interest. At 5 PM some special interest group met and opportunities were provided for state callers to get together \& discuss mutual concerns. Dinner was slightly formal with presentations for those callers who had completed their 25 th year of calling as well as awards to callers attending from a foreign country. This year included a guest speaker on "Leadership". By 11 most activities ceased, but many side conversations continued on to the wee hours.

Breakfast at 7:30 Tuesday with meetings again from 9 on. 6 sesslons concurrently for $1 \frac{1}{2}$ hours; coffee break; another $1 \frac{1}{2}$ hour session. While choreography was among the more popular, over 400 attended the debate between Jim Mayo, Chr, of Mainstream LTi \& Bill Peters, Chr of Accreditati on the topic of Programing For Survival.

The afternoon has 2 sessions for the callers partner as well as 6 addi tional concurrent sessions with taxes \& record keeping getting the full' house. Again at 5 some special interest groups met. The banquet is the highlight with the Chr. of the Board's message followed by the prestigiou: Milestone presentations.

After a 7:30 Wednesday breakfast, the final business meeting began promptly at 9. 24 resolutions were presented - fully discussed \& action taken. The new Executive Committee of Jon Jones, Chr., Curley Custer, Jack Lasry, Jim Mayo \& Bill Peters was announced. John Kaltenthaler remain as Executive Secretary with Herb Egender selected as the new Assistant Executive Secretary.

This year the Executive Committee invited 2 couples from ROUNDALAB, LEGACY \& the National Executive Committee as a part of open communications \& a spirit of cooperation. The 6 couples participated in all segments of the convention \& helped with information of mutual interest.

Oh yes, somewhere attendees also found time to visit the 18 exhibitors who brought their merchandise \& services for their fellow members to see first hand. The next CALLERLAB Convention will be April 13-15 at the Radisson Muehlebach in Kansas City.

What does it cost a caller to attend? Airfare of about $\$ 250$. Hotel costs of $\$ 240$. Convention costs of $\$ 95$; miscellaneous meals, cab fares, tips - $\$ 50$ - not to mention lost bookings revenues by being away from home. Are CALLERLAB members dedicated to improving themseIves? The above will help you formulate your answer.
